YOU—AN INVENTOR? Students in grades K-12 are putting their imagination to work by entering a science contest.

The program asks kids to work in teams to choose a current technology and imagine what it might be like in 20 years. More than 250,000 students across the U.S. and Canada have participated in the program so far.

Past ideas include everything from a special diagnostic glove that would allow women to give themselves high-tech self breast exams to a hovering device that would seek out and destroy land mines.

First-place winners will each receive U.S. savings bonds worth \$10,000 at maturity. Second-place winners will receive \$5,000 savings bonds. The program is funded by Toshiba Corporation, Toshiba America Group Companies, and Toshiba America Foundation and administered by the National Science Teacher's Association.
