## Keeping Children Safe During The Holidays

(NAPSA)—Holidays are a special time for children, so naturally it's easy to forget that the holidays can hold special risks for kids.

To help you and your young friends and family have a safer holiday season, here are a few safety tips from the experts at the Electrical Safety Foundation International:

- Keep young holiday visitors safe by preparing your home before they arrive.

- If your home is not already "childproof," install tamper-resistant receptacles or use safety covers on all unused electrical outlets, including on extension cords.

- Store breakables, candles, matches and other potentially dangerous items in inaccessible or locked areas.

- Don't forget to put away small items, such as buttons or coins, which can be choking hazards.

- Use safety gates at the top and bottom of stairways to keep babies and toddlers safe.

- Consider turning your water heater down to 120 degrees Fahrenheit to reduce the risk of scalding.

- Do not use space heaters in rooms where children will be unsupervised.

- Adult supervision is required in the kitchen when something is cooking or when a range or stove is within reach.

- Keep children at least three feet away from cooking appliances.

- Decorations are not toys. Never allow children to play with electrical decorations or cords. Place cords out of reach of small children.

- Avoid putting Christmas tree

lights, ornaments, metal hooks and other small decorations near the ground or on the lower limbs, where they may be reached by young children.

- In homes with small children, take special care to avoid decorations that are sharp or breakable.

- Keep matches, lighters and candle displays out of reach of children.
