“In the 50 years since Eisenhower’s speech, America has transformed his dream of the peaceful atom into prosperity for the world’s citizens,” explains Larry Foulke, president of the American Nuclear Society (ANS).

Today, civilian nuclear power reactors provide 20 percent of our country’s electricity without adding to air pollution. Nearly 10 million nuclear medicine procedures are performed each year in the U.S. The world’s scientists recognize the technology for the safe disposal of radioactive waste. More than three million Americans are employed in nuclear science and technology fields.
